THE CITY OF BRASOV

A visit to Brașov is an opportunity to experience its cultural life. The statue of Johannes Honterus near the Black Church, by the Finnish sculptor Harro Magnussen, embodies the great Enlightenment humanist who brought Protestantism to Brașov and authored notable pedagogical and geographical writings.

Brașov has one of the finest natural settings in Romania and Europe. The Southern part of the town is towered by the 960 m high Mount Tâmpa, and is neighboured about 10 km farther by Poiana Brașov, a lovely winter and summer resort. The contemporary city is an active industrial, shopping, tourist and cultural centre, a permanent attraction for hundreds of thousands of tourists from Romania and abroad. Those who, at one time, lived in Brașov come to miss it and wish to return.

The beginnings and development of higher education in Brașov are rooted in the town's cultural tradition and intensive cultural climate. Technical and scientific creation, rich artistic activity in a variety of fields, mass culture, as well as quality teaching and study in schools of all levels, blend together in harmony.

ERASMUS+ FORMS + AND REQUIREMENTS

REGISTRATION

The registration takes place at the Erasmus Office (29 Eroilor Boulevard, 1st floor), upon your arrival in Brașov. For registration, you are required to present the following documents:

 Passport (and required visa if you come from a country outside the EU) or ID card (for EU citizens);

3 passport photos;

BEFORE LEAVING BRAȘOV DON'T FORGET TO:

Fill in your Finalizing Form, get it signed by the authorized persons and present it at the Erasmus Office, one day before your departure.

Ask your Departmental Erasmus Coordinator to issue a statement about your activity in Braşov (examinations, seminars, project work etc.). In case the results and the grades of your evaluation have not been issued before your departure, they will be sent to your university at a later time (Transcript of Records). A written report from you on your experience during your stay in Braşov would be very welcome at the Erasmus Office (Student Report Form).

Medical Insurance will be paid in each applicant's native/sending country. In Romania, emergencies are free of charge.

RESIDENCE REQUIREMENTS

Students who will reside in Romania for more than 90 days need to apply for a registration certificate/residence permit. Within 59 days after their arrival to Romania, the student has to report to the Foreigners' Registration Office in order to obtain the registration certificate/residence permit.

The European Health card or a medical certificate (for non-EU students) issued by the Student Medical Dispensary of Transilvania University of Braşov ("Dispensarul Studenţesc"). A statement about your source of financing covering the costs of your stay in Romania (you will receive the statement form "Declarație" at the police office);

One photo;

• Your lease agreement or contract.

LIVING IN BRAȘOV

The following information should give you an idea of the average cost of living in our country. The amounts may, however, vary according to your personal lifestyle.

MEALS

If you are living in the University Campuses (Colina or Memo) you will find it convenient to have lunch at the Student Cafeteria ("Cantina studențească"), for about 5 euro/meal.

There are evidently many restaurants in town that offer more varied meals from a wide range of European, Asian, Italian or Mexican cuisines, for ≈ 10-25 euro/meal.

Food markets and supermarkets are opened every day.

ACCOMMODATION

University campus accommodation costs about 150 euro/person/month.

Student bedrooms are fully furnished and equipped with a sink. You will have access to a shared bathroom. No kitchens are available.

Accommodation arrangements should be made in advance by filling in the Student Accommodation Request Form and sending it to the Erasmus Office (incoming@unitbv.ro).

RENTING AN APARTMENT

If you choose to rent an apartment or a house in Brașov, we strongly advise you to contact a real-estate agency ("agenție imobiliară"). They can provide you with information about the most interesting offers on the market.

The accommodation cost varies with the type, location, size and facilities, approximately 250-450 euro/month/apartment. Usually, you have to pay extra for all utilities: water, electricity, gas, telephone etc., about 150 euro/month.

A deposit representing the rent for the first three months is usually required. It will be refunded at the end of your stay, provided that you leave the apartment in good condition.

If you decide to rent an apartment, a signed lease contract is needed, used also for temporary residence permit application.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

The Brașov public transportation network is very extensive and services run late into the night; specialized all-night services are also available.

Tickets can be bought at specialized RATBv kiosks or from newsagents, but remember to punch them in the bus. Even though there are no ticket gates when entering the vehicles, it's advisable to have a valid ticket because ticket inspections are frequent. When someone requests your ticket, always ask them to see a job ID.

One bus/trolley bus 2-ways ticket: 5 lei.

TAXI COMPANIES

Taxis are a faster and more comfortable way to get around town than public transportation. Taxis are also relatively cheap. All taxis must have meters and drivers are usually friendly.

Ask the approximate fare in advance and always make sure the driver uses the meter from the start. Check the taxi's door for the price (lei/km).

Taxis are usually parked in designated areas, which are in the proximity of bus stations or other busy spots.

When travelling outside city limits, you may be asked to pay the double fare per km (it is considered acceptable), or you could agree on a fixed amount in advance.

Never get into a taxi that does not have a sign with the company name on top.

CURRENCY

The Romanian official currency is the leu (plural lei). 1 leu has 100 bani. The exchange rate is established by the National Bank. The current exchange rate is about $1 \in = 5$ lei. It is advisable to exchange money at banks or at Exchange offices available all around the city.

You can use your foreign debit card at ATMs and you will be issued the equivalent in lei of the amount of euro or US dollars indicated by you. Romanian ATMs only accept Visa, MasterCard and Maestro. Depending on your needs, there are several possibilities for money transfer: bank transfer or special transfer (such as Western Union), postal money order ("mandat poştal").
